4-H PUBLIC SPEAKING HELPS YOU TO:

- Write and organize your thoughts on a particular subject
- Build confidence in yourself
- Deliver your thoughts in a convincing way

I. READY

A. <u>Decide on a subject</u>. Good 4-H speeches are based on things you know about or experiences you've had. The speech does not have to be about 4-H but you might mention how 4-H relates to your subject, if possible.

Here are some suggestions for speech topics:

4-H Citizenship
Respect Honesty
Family Character
Freedom My Life Goal
Someone you admire, a hero, etc.
Information on a 4-H Project

Ask yourself these questions about your topic:

- —. Is it something my audience will be interested in?
- A. Is the topic too big to be covered in the time allowed?
- v. Do I have first hand experience with it?
- ⇔. Can 4-H relate to it in any way?

B. <u>Collect your thoughts</u>. Do some research on your subject. You may want to use newspaper, magazines, or 4-H project materials. Put the information in your own words. **DO NOT COPY YOUR SPEECH OUT OF A BOOK!** List 10-15 ideas you want to mention about your topic.

II. <u>SET</u>

- A. <u>Organize your ideas</u>. Put your ideas in the order you w ant to say them so that your speech is logical and easy to understand. Here are the main parts of speech.
- 1. <u>INTRODUCTION</u>- a question, statement, or experience that attracts the audience's attention to your topic.
- 2. <u>BODY</u>- the main part of your speech where you present the facts about your topic.
- 3. <u>CONCLUSION</u>- sum up your speech into one or two sentences. State the points you want the audience to remember.

- B. Write your speech on 3 X 5 note cards or paper. You should not read your speech but be familiar with it so you will only have to glance at your notes.
- C. <u>Time your speech</u>. Time for grade levels are listed on the back of this page.

III. GO

- A. <u>Practice giving your speech</u>. Say it in front of a mirror, your pet, your parents and friends. Listen to their advice to improve your speech. If you have a tape recorder, listen to your speech and correct mistakes.
- B. Here are some suggestions to help you:

 1. EYE CONTACT Look directly into the eyes of your audience in various areas of the room.
- 2. POSTURE Stand tall with feet slightly apart. Try not to sway back and forth or stand on one foot and then the other. Do not lean on the speaker's stand.
- 3. VOICE Speak loudly enough for everyone to hear. Speak slowly and clearly. Emphasize any important words. Smile at your audience. Show them you have confidence in your speech!
- 4. NOTES may be used, but do not READ your speech.

READY, SET, GO! Start working on your speech today. You will be glad you did!

5th Grade 2-3 minutes

6th Grade 3-4 minutes

Junior High (7^{th} and 8^{th}) 4-5 minutes at the county contest.
